Numerous manhole covers have been hot-patched.


The dip on Croydon Road has been repaired.

ALDI DEVELOPMENT APPROVED BY THE ZBA

On September 24th the Zoning Board of Appeals approved, by a 4 to 1 vote, the application by Aldi to construct a grocery store at the corner of Blossom and Winton Roads on the site of the former parcels belonging to Roly Door, Jim's Diner, the old Bill and Earl's car repair shop and three houses to the north. The combined parcels, of approximately 1.3 acres, wrap around behind the Tops' gas station.

Despite the subject parcel's location outside the BNA boundaries, BNA had filed a letter on June 17th in opposition to the development based on Browncroft neighbors' ongoing concerns for the N. Winton Road corridor -- that the "big box" building size and design was not in keeping with the urban village appearance; the projected increase in traffic at the already busy Blossom/Winton intersection would be untenable and a burden on nearby neighbors; and that the granting of a variance amounted to a rezoning of the parcel to C-2.

North Winton Village Neighborhood Association's Board of Directors supported the variance due to their many meetings with other interested but less suitable developers for the site, and ultimately with the Aldi representatives. They feel this use and building, with the changes they were able to negotiate and a lot of landscaping, will be an improvement to the area.

The number of variances needed, after two redesigns, were reduced from seven to three. The problems remaining were the building size, at 15,000 square feet, was greater than the allowed 3,000 square feet, the height of the Aldi logo entrance signs, and the posi-

tion of the windows on the Winton Road frontage, which start four feet from the ground instead of the required three feet.

The case was originally heard on July 23rd and adjourned twice, with recommendations from the Zoning Board to bring the building up to the street, increase the windows on the building, move the enclosed shopping cart area to the side, and increase the landscaping. These things had been done by the September 24th hearing.

Browncroft "Stop Aldi" residents spoke very persuasively in opposition to granting a variance.

In the Zoning Board's deliberations it was discussed at great length that big box stores are not consistent with the city's design standards. However, there are mitigating factors such as the proximity of other big boxes nearby and that Aldi had worked with NWNVA in good faith to improve the building design itself in order to make the building more in keeping with an urban village. The design upgrades included the addition of brick surfaces to more of the building, decorative lighting, awnings, benches and wrought iron fences. Also, it was stated that improvements to the vacant site could add vibrancy to the area.

It was also discussed that the projected traffic would most likely be travelers already using the intersection, and the issue would be how to handle the ingress and egress by regulating right hand and left hand turns into and out of the Blossom Road and Winton Road driveways. However, one board member sympathized with a resident

NEW ADDITIONS TO THE CORWIN STREETScape



Those of us who appreciate the traditional Browncroft subdivision landscape of tree-lined sidewalks have cause to celebrate the two newly planted maples at 144 Corwin Road.

When one of the original Brown Brothers Norway maples came down in a storm earlier this summer, the Regans promptly replanted with what appears to be a red maple and also replaced their other ailing Browncroft maple that was 30 feet away.

It will be many years before these young trees provide the

shade cover that we had always enjoyed in Browncroft during hot and humid summer months. But their replanting of shade trees on their private property, within the 5 foot area along the sidewalks, is a generous act of Browncroft neighborhood spirit, preservation and restoration.

Historical Note: Property owners who have a space(s) to the inside of the sidewalk that is missing a shade tree, please consider planting an indigenous maple, oak, linden or tulip tree in order to keep our Browncroft historic landscape alive and providing us with the graceful, protective and cooling shade we need going into the future. The trees were originally planted by Brown Brothers Nursery for Browncroft Realty every 30 feet apart in order to create a “park-

like setting” in which to build the homes. You can see places where the sidewalks or the driveways to the houses take a strange turn around a tree. Now you know why – the trees came first!

from Marion Street who pointed out that her street would become a cut through if traffic was forced to turn right out of the Blossom Road driveway, and then get back to Winton Road somehow. It was said that these details could be worked out by the county traffic engineers, according to their review of the traffic study, if and when a traffic problem develops.

The ZBA made a few more cosmetic modifications to the design plans as a condition of approval before the vote was taken.

BEING AWARE OF CRIME.

Two of the most effective ways to stop crime is to be aware by knowing what is happening in our area and then what we must do routinely in order to prevent it.

In the last 30 days we have had 4 cars taken and 3 burglaries. Two of the burglaries, which were on streets adjacent to Browncroft NA streets, were solved; but the other in Browncroft was not. At the time of this writing the car thefts have not been solved either.

The most fundamental solutions to most crimes are to lock your windows, doors and cars, keep the lights on in your houses if you are away so your house doesn't look unoccupied, and keep your garage doors closed and locked especially if you are not at home. And be a "nosey neighbor". If you see something that seems out of place or you suspect a crime call 911. Do not hesitate as you could be preventing a crime from happening.

Fall Clean Up in the Browncroft Rose Garden

Saturday, October 24th, 9:30 A.M.

UPDATE ON N. WINTON ROAD CONSTRUCTION/RESURFACING:

Over the summer the utilities have mostly been completed. There remains water main work from Juniper to Corwin. The project was significantly delayed due to a legal dispute in the acquisition of property to straighten out the intersection at Juniper Road and Humbolt Road. The call for bids to resurface N. Winton went out 9/21/2015. The bids will be opened on 10/13/15 and then referred to City Council for confirmation. The City will award the resurfacing contract in December. Refurfacing will start in April (weather permitting) with a completion date of July/August. (Information provided by Jim Hubbard, COR)

Browncroft Area 2015 Leaf Collection Will Be November 10th to 14th

Leaf Collection Guidelines:

Rake loose leaves into a pile between the sidewalk and the curb before Tuesday November 10th. If you miss the collection period, leaves should be bagged and placed at the curb on your regular refuse collection day. Do not expect the city crews to return and pick up unbagged leaves after November 14th.

DO NOT RAKE LEAVES INTO THE STREET, where they clog the drains and create slippery areas. Loose leaves can also be dropped off at Ferrano and Colfax streets. Collected leaves are composted and made available to residents, along with stone and wood chips, through the City's free Give-Back Program. The site, located at Ferrano and Colfax Streets is open from 8:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M. daily, April through December.
