From the BNA President ...

Our 2010 Membership remains strong at around 300 households containing roughly 575 adults and 95 children; this out of a 672 household Browncroft community - all being represented by this the Browncroft Neighborhood Association. The largest tracts are Browncroft on the south and Elmcroft on the north (bookend on the east by the John Carlton estate's tracts along 590).

As your President, I continue to be in contact with our SE Neighborhood Service Center (NSC), Rochester Police Department (RPD), Crime Prevention Officer (CPO), and North Winton Village Association (NWVA) weekly. Monthly I meet with the NBN Sector 8 Planning Committee, Neighborhood Association Presidents / Sector Leaders, and RPD Eastside Commander's Sector 8 Police Citizens Interactive Committee (PCIC).

Through our Board and committees, BNA is working on our BNA priorities: Street light modernization, School 46 neighborhood connectivity, PACTAC and police presence, preserving an owner occupied residential neighborhood through zoning and enforcement, historical character, NORC, Rose Garden, Browncroft web site, and Crier newsletter.

BNA is also interacting along with NWVA with the businesses along Winton Rd. and East Main Street - gateway to Browncroft - with economic development. We have participants representing Browncroft throughout the city and county as the needs arise from parks to festivals.

NEIGHBORWORKS ROCHESTER ENERGY SERVICE LOAN

There is an energy services loan for homeowners looking to increase the efficiency of their home. The loan is very affordable because NWR eliminated most closing costs, and has an energy auditor on staff that will provide a cost benefit analysis highlighting improvements that will have the greatest impact on energy usage, some of which are eligible for grants or rebates through NYSERDA.

Terms of the loan are as follows: 3 to 5 years, in amounts from \$1,000-\$4,999, unsecured, 6% interest rate, no income limits. Applicants must have: minimum 650 credit score, energy audit done, savings to investment ratio 1:1.

A Parent-to-Parent Resource for City Residents

With kindergarten registration under way now in the Rochester City School District, Flower City Parents Network provides a source of information and support for city school parents, potential city school parents and those interested in city schools.

Flower City Parents Network, celebrating its one-year anniversary in February, features an online forum run by parents and for parents. Parents can ask other parents questions about specific schools, get information about district policies, share experiences with after-school programs, or weigh in on subjects like mayoral control or charter schools.

Flower City Parents Network was started by three parents (including one from the Browncroft neighborhood) who were frustrated that many people wrote off city schools before even finding out about them. They wanted to make it easier for new parents to get the first-hand scoop from parents with children already in city schools, and for parents to share information and experiences across the district.
