


BNA can do more with more, won't you help? Participate and contribute to the maintenance of your neighborhood.

# ATTENTION READERS!

The grassy strip of land between the sidewalk and the curbs that were torn up during the sidewalk repairs this past fall will be seeded and repaired by the middle of May if they were not done last fall according to the Dept. of Engineering.

For those neighbors whose maple trees suffered root damage, the City Forester and Mike Tanzini of Ted Collins, Assoc., recommend that these trees receive root fertilization and top pruning to compensate for this shock if the trees are to survive. However, City Forestry cannot administer to trees on private property, which leaves the responsibility of saving these trees to the property owners.

### HIGHLIGHTS

More appreciated than gratitude would be other helping hands joining in to make the work lighter for everyone throughout the year.



# **UPDATE**

One January 25, 1980, BNA spoke at the Public Hearing on the proposed new routes for RTS Buses in our neighborhood. On April 7th, those new routes went into effect. Because of the relatively high frequency of bus service down Newcastle Road approaching 5 min. intervals during rush hours, BNA at its April Board meeting initiated the formation of an Ad Hoc Comm. on Transit Service to study the present area needs for bus service, establish contacts with RTS, and propose required alterations to the service if deemed necessary. This temporary Committee should complete its work by September. EDMAC UPDATE: On April 30th, the Brighton Planning Board held a special meeting to decide on the site plans submitted by Edmac for their Blossom Rd. plant. They approved the site plan with 10 conditions. Among them was increased planting of trees around the parking lots and moving the driveway to be in line with Gaslight Lane. The neighbors have met and a large number of them are weighing the option of taking joint legal action to seek to overturn the Brighton Zoning Board of Appeal's original granting of the zoning varience allowing the driveway access to the site.
