PAC-TAC (Police and Citizens - Together Against Crime)

Pac-Tac enters its 21st month of operation in the Browncroft Neighborhood this September. It continues on a Monday-Thursday, 7-10PM patrol beat schedule. We have, presently, 44 neighbors in the Corwin-Winton-Blossom area walking and 10 neighbors in the Browncroft-Winton-Elmcroft area. The Highland Section of the RPD has over 18 beats and over 250 volunteers.

The Pac-Tac members were entertained by the RPO and its Broadway Music Revue at the "Salute to City Volunteers" in May. A Pac-Tac summer picnic was held at Ellison Park in July with the raffling off of a VCR as a fundraiser. Pac-Tac'ers participated in a Bowl-a-Thon fund raiser along with NEAD, Highland Section and Goodman Street in May. Pac-Tac volunteers received recognition certificates from Mayor Ryan and Chief Leach.

We would like 30 more volunteers for our Pac-Tac Patrols, especially in the Northern section of BNA. Sign up and become active Pac-Tac'ers. The program is highly successful and rewarding. STOP SIGNS ON DORCHESTER ROAD

The BNA was notified by a concerned Dorchester resident of the Department of Traffic Engineering's plan to install a four-way stop at the corner of Dorchester, Gramercy and Arbordale. The request for stop signs was made to the Traffic Control Board by the Rochester Police Department based on the high incidence of "fender benders" occuring in the past three years because of poor visibility due to fences, low growing shrubbery and the curve in Dorchester Road. According to computerized police reports, there have been sixteen accidents in the past three years. Unfortunately, a provision of installing the signs was the removal of bottom branches of a very fine magnolia in order to ensure that one stop sign be visible from a required distance.

STREET LIGHT UPDATE

According to Carol Manis of the City's Streetlighting Department, the City is currently engaged with finishing contracts for the installation of their new fiberglass streetlight system and will not begin to address the details involved with putting together the concrete system for neighborhoods such as Browncroft until after the first of the year. She has assured the BNA that those neighborhoods involved (Browncroft, Cobbs Hill Area, Rundel and Arnold Parks) will be contacted at that time to meet with the City in order to discuss matters concerning available concrete pole designs, harp salvage from RG&E and related costs. KEEPING BROWNCROFT BEAUTIFUL

Many neighbors have been giving some extra attention to their tree islands (the strip of green between the sidewalk and street) by pruning weeding and edging around ornamentals and planting flowers. These efforts have not gone unnoticed by this resident who is a walker and struggling gardner. It is hoped that the rest of the neighborhood appreciates the work of these neighbors who create more attractive surroundings for all, while beautifying their own properties.

The condition of tree islands in a neighborhood have a strong visual impact on the appearance of property in general. Being in the foreground of our field of vision, edged and tidy tree islands and sidewalks make an instant good impression and, conversely, overgrown tree islands with neglected barespots where weeds take hold and muddy, unedged sidewalks contribute to an impression of dereliction in a neighborhood.

Browncroft has a reputation with municipal departments of being sensitive about its trees and "antique" ornamental plantings; the wisteria, magnolie, lilac and spirea clumps throughout the area. It is gratifying to see that residents are living up to that reputation and preserving that idyllic ambiance that is our legacy.
