National Register Nomination

Work continues on the cultural resource survey for the nomination of Browncroft to the National Register of Historic Places, as a premiere example of an early twentieth century planned subdivision and landscape. It is hoped that the extensive documentation and the historical context statement will be ready for the September Board meeting of the State Department of Parks Recreation and Historic Preservation.

Our regional Field Investigator from the State, who will be our presenter/advocate before the Board, has met recently with us to go over some of the preliminary preparations prior to the Board meeting, and to review slides of the neighborhood which will be shown to the review board. The Board's time will be limited; therefore, the neighborhood architecture, landscaping and general character must be exhibited in only 20 color slides. The cultural resource survey document itself, however, contains a black and white photograph of every home, as well as views of the landscape.

The proposed Browncroft Historic District nomination is more complex than the other historic neighborhood nominations in Rochester because it is considered significant as an historic landscape as well as a collection of architectural elements. As a result the nomination document is more like two nominations in one.

Though being listed on the National Register is strictly honorary, it provides a sense of place in the community which will help contribute to an understanding of, and commitment to, preservation.

It is never too late to make contributions to the History Fund. Starting with the next issue of the Crier, the names of all neighbors who have contributed to the fund will be published as a way to recognize and thank those who are making the Browncroft Historic District possible.
