Browncroft Historic District Listed on the National Register of Historic Places

It is done, at last. Browncroft is officially listed on the Department of Interior's National Register of Historic Places as a district of historically significant architecture and landscape design.

The Keeper of the National Register signed the nomination on April 20th in Washington D.C.

The Browncroft historic district is roughly bounded by Browncroft Boulevard and part of Merchants Road on the north to, but not including, Blossom Road on the south, Winton Road on the west to Newcastle Road on the east. This area primarily defines the original Browncroft Subdivision that was developed out of the nursery properties of Brown Brothers Continental Nurseries, which operated in the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries.

The cultural resource survey document which had to be prepared for the State and National historic preservation agencies will eventually show up on the federal web site, where everyone will have easy access.

Although the listing is strictly honorary, it is hoped that residents present and future will recognize those qualities their properties have that contribute to the unique character of the neighborhood, and consider how best to preserve them.

In Memorial to Hilland Knapp

It is with deep sorrow that we report Bill Knapp, of Dorchester Road, died Saturday, May 1st from complications leading to congenital heart failure. He was much loved by his neighbors all around, and by this writer who, as a young neighborhood organizer, made his acquaintance in the 1970's when he was City Forester.

Mr. Knapp was the City Forester from 1966 to 1975 and subsequently the Director of Parks for the City of Rochester until his retirement in 1988. During that time he replanted Dorchester Road and the Elmcroft Subdivision streets after the Dutch elm disease wiped out the street trees in the 1960's, assisted the BNA beautification volunteers in rehabilitating the Browncroft Rose Garden at the corner of Browncroft Boulevard and Merchants Road in the 1970's, and promoted the tree planting project in the 1980's on Winton Road from Blossom to Merchants Roads by instructing his successor City Forester to "Give them what they want."

By retirement, Mr. Knapp had moved into Browncroft from the 19th Ward with his wife Betty, and continued to be Browncroft's tree guardian angel, working as a volunteer using his knowledge of horticulture and history.

He resided in the Browncroft neighborhood for approximately 25 years. During that time he performed two surveys for the neighborhood association of the trees in the public right-of ways and front yards of over 400 properties on 12 streets-first in as documentation for the neighborhood's cultural resource survey for its nomination to the National Register of Historic Places. Without his expertise in documenting the historic landscape elements integral to the neighborhood's historic significance, Browncroft would not have been able to move forward toward this important recognition.

In addition, serving as a member of the Board of Directors for Monroe County People for Parks, Inc, a not-forprofit parks advocacy group, he became an advocate for saving trees and for park preservation countywide. He was involved in exposing the tragic removal by the County of Monroe of 11 one hundred year old oak trees in Genesee Valley Park for a driving range.

He participated in the Genesee Valley Recreation and Park Society's annual "March for Parks" walking under the Browncroft Neighborhood Association banner. Because he had raised the most amount of money that year for local park projects, the Browncroft Rose Garden was awarded a \$400 dollar grant from the proceeds of the march, which was used for the purchace of decorative stone benches.

He is survived by his wife of 53 years, Elizabeth Knapp; two sons, Robert and James; two grandchildren, his sister Janet Phillips of Florida and brother Richard Knapp of Norwich, New York, his godson, Jeremy Wilson, and many, many loving friends and neighbors.
